FAIR EXHIBITS – If you noticed in the list of dates on the calendar, starting in July Eagle Grange will be busy taking its 2024 educational ehixbit to fairs all over cenetral Pennsylvania. This project, long a tradition of Granges all over the country, is a wonderful way to educate the public about agriculture and the Grange's commitment to rural communities.

This year's exhibit theme established by the State Association of County Fairs and the PA Department of Agricuture is "*Flourishing with Opportunites & Rooted in Agricutlure*". Jenn Nauss and Phil Vonada, both very artically talented, are taking the lead to develop Eagle's exhibit that will go to five fairs – *Lycoming County, Montour-Delong, Perry County, Junaita County and Bloomsburg* – with minor adaptations at each to fit the specific spaces.

A volunteer (or two) are needed to help with set up and removal of the exhbit at each fair. Please contact Phil or Jenn if you are willing to help with this; it only takes an hour or so each time.

COMING IN 2025 - At the last Grange meeting a communication was read seeking financial support for the 2025 State Grange session being hosted in Williamsport by the the Granges of northcentral PA. It was suggested that action on this request be postponed until after fair season and then designate all or part of the exhibit premiums earned to support this event. Eagle has also been asked to host and provide a light breakfast for the overnight Junior Jamboree that will take place during the 2025 convention.

Insulation/Siding Project on Track for Fall

Details are falling into place for the major property improvement goal for 2024 set at the annual planning meeting in January. By vote of the Grange on June 4th, a contract for \$34,309 has been awarded to Amos King of King's Electrical & Plumbing to install 1" foam insulation and vinyl siding plus soffit and fascia on the hall, including the cinder block kitchen addition.

Mr. King has sprovided sample materials and members/friends reviewed them over lunch on June 22nd to select colors. The consensus was *Heritage Cream* for the siding.and *Cypress* (a shade of green) for the trim – soffit, fascia and wrapping of door & window frames. Long-time member Joann Murray recalls the hall as originally trimmed in green. The actual work on-site should begin in September.

Right now we are waiting on an inspection of the roof by Jonathan Fisher Roofing. It seemed a wise move to take check on the condition of the roof before proceeding with the siding since it has been many years since the existing metal roof was last painted. We suspect the roof should be painted again.

Financially, a report shared at the last meeting showed \$29,500 available for the project (a combination of donations, commitments and reserve funds in the checking account), putting us within \$4,809 of the goal. The Grange has received the offer of an interest-free loan for this balance needed so the vote to proceed was affirmative.

The Montgomery FFA Chapter has stepped forward to remove the old bushes around the Grange Hall when students from the Earth Science Center of the Penn College of Technology are ready to re-design and re-plant our landscape shrubbery. This work might not take place until the spring of 2025; when this gets underway, the Grange will be responsible only for the cost of the materials.
